ALLOTMENTS & COMMUNITY GARDENS SURVEY RESULTS

1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

1.1 To share the results of the recent allotments & community gardens survey and set out the next steps

2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1 In January 2021, the Town Council jointly with Llantilio Pertholey Community Council launched a public survey to find out more about residents gardening habits. The survey was available online and in paper copy.
- 2.2 The survey was publicised on social media, in the Abergavenny Chronicle, by direct contact with existing groups and on the Town Council's website.

3. RESULTS

- 3.1 One hundred and eighty-eight people responded to the survey of which 47% were aged over 60 years and only 3% below 30 years old. The majority, 68% of respondents were female. The analysis is set out in the appendix.
- 3.2 Only 8% of respondents did not grow any fruit and vegetables in 2020, leaving 92% of respondents growing fruit and vegetables in an allotment (17%), garden (71%), shared space (6%) or windowsills/pots/balcony (11%). From those that responded, a higher percentage of over 60s grow on an allotment (24%) than under 60s (11%)
- 3.3 Three-quarters of respondents consider themselves to be an experienced gardener, with the percentage rising to 87% in the over 60 category and decreasing to 64% in the under 60s.
- 3.4 Respondents that did not grow any fruit and vegetables in 2020 were asked what prevents them from growing food. It should be noted that this question should only have been answered by those respondents who had not grown any fruit and vegetables ie 15 respondents however 63 people responded so this may reflect an unmet demand for additional growing space in addition to people's existing growing space or a misreading of the survey. The main reason given for not growing food is lack of a garden or allotment (75%), too busy (19%), don't know how (13%), lack of money (2%), not physically able (3%) or not interested (2%). The proportion of respondents answering 'too busy' and 'don't know how' increases in the under 60 age group 26% and 14% respectively.
- 3.5 When asked whether establishing allotments or community garden spaces is a good idea, 69% replied 'yes I would want to have a plot or get involved' and 30% replied 'yes for other people but not for me'. Only 1% replied 'no the money could be better spent'.
- 3.6 54% of respondents would require a small allotment plot or raised bed. The survey did not offer any explanation of the size of a small plot nor did it differentiate between a

small plot or raised bed so this figure can be broken down further. 32% of respondents would want a large allotment and 48% would want a garden to share with other people and share produce. Respondents in the over 60 age group were less likely to want a large plot (24%) compared to slightly more in the under 60s age group (39%).

- 3.7 The reasons given for wanting to get involved in growing food was healthy exercise & healthy food (75%), environmental and social concern (54%), company and social activity (50%) and save money and have cheap food for my family (27%). Environmental concern was higher in the under 60s (59%) than in over 60s (48%). Interestingly, company and social activity was lower in the over 60s (47%) than in the under 60s (53%).
- 3.8 Respondents were given the opportunity to provide additional comments on reasons for wanting to grow and also more general comments were invited. These covered opportunities for bulk buying and seed exchange, setting up a scheme where people can share their garden space, donating surplus produce, using small areas of scrubland for growing, importance of a range of plot sizes to suit different needs, involving young people and promoting permaculture and forest gardening.
- 3.9 The survey also captured the ward where respondents lived to gauge an idea of where any future provision should be located. The survey asked for contact details so that respondents can be kept informed

4. **CONCLUSIONS**

- 4.1 Although the number of respondents was limited, there does appear an appetite for more growing space. There is a waiting list for the allotments in Llanfoist of approximately 3 years.
- 4.2 The growing space required is a mix of large plots, small plots, raised beds and shared space so that offers flexibility for the organisations that will potentially providing growing space.
- 4.3 A number of respondents indicated their willingness to consider sharing their large garden thus providing an opportunity to pilot the adopt a garden scheme.

5. NEXT STEPS

- 5.1 In terms of next steps, the following is suggested:
 - All respondents that provided an email address are sent a summary of the results and details of the next steps. (Town Clerk)
 - All County Councillors in the study area are sent a summary of the results (Town Clerk)
 - The summary is also published on Town Council website and Facebook page (Town Clerk)
 - Initial informal discussion is held with MCC (Estates & Food Development Officer) and MHA (more significant public landowners) prior to a wider meeting (Town Clerk)
 - A Teams meeting is convened by the Town Clerk involving officers and members from MCC including Estates, representatives from Melin Homes,


- Charter Housing and Monmouthshire Housing Association together with representatives from Abergavenny Town Council and Llantilio Pertholey CC. The purpose of the meeting would be to share findings and seek a commitment to providing a range of additional growing space in Abergavenny.
- The working group reconvenes to identify any 'quick wins' to capitalise on enthusiasm generated by the survey.
- Town Clerk contacts CLAS (Community Land Advisory Service) and FCFCG (Federation of City Farms and Community Gardens) and other support agencies to determine available advice and support.
- To take forward a pilot of the adopt a garden scheme with 10 gardens maximum initially contacting those respondents that highlighted that they had a large garden that they would be willing to share (Town Clerk)
