The Abergavenny area comprises of 6 wards, with 17 Councillors, representing an electorate of 8335, and wider population of 13,500 residents. It's precept going in to 2023/24 will be just over £500,000.

The Council has no land assets, but manages green spaces in partnership with MCC and various volunteer groups. We employ a Town Team, who are currently being given horticultural training to assist in the maintenance of the urban planting schemes.

The Council has a statutory duty to contribute to the unitary authority's Wellbeing Plan. This is facilitated through a Strategy and Action Plan which has specific reference to the seven priorities of the Act. The Council has also adopted a Climate Emergency Policy with specific reference to protecting and enhancing biodiversity and this is embedded in the Strategy and Action Plan.

# Review of s6 duty

We have seen significant improvements in replanted areas in terms of enhancing biodiversity. We have seen increased volunteer hours and community engagement. Having a Strategy and Action Plan to work towards, and to evolve to meet changing circumstances and new projects and challenges.

Restrictions from Covid and lock downs caused delays to our timetable of improvements. Increased costs of materials and labour. Getting the message out to explain the interventions that are being made to increase biodiversity.

We have regular meetings with stakeholders, and are beginning to look at more effective use of social media, to inform the community of the work that is being undertaken.

How and when will the s6 duty be monitored and the s6 plan reviewed?

The Strategy and Action Plan is reviewed monthly as part of ATC's Environment Committee's agenda. A precis of the progress in delivering our biodiversity targets is included in our Annual Report.
