





Yuzovka: The Ukrainian City Founded by a Welsh Industrialist

John Hughes (1814-1889) was a Welsh industrialist, inventor and pioneer. More surprisingly, however, he was also the founder of the <u>Ukrainian city of Donetsk</u>, a man who kick-started an industrial revolution in the southern Donbass, which changed the course of history for this corner of Eastern Europe.

Cultural Lectures and Performances:

• Speeches by guests and Ukrainians who will share their experiences.

Gareth Jones was assassinated in 1935 in China, the day before his 30th birthday; but his story and its impact in giving voice to the Ukrainian people has been told in <u>Agnieska Holland's 2020 film 'Mr Jones'</u> – inspired by his niece' Margaret Siriol Colley's research, and recently <u>commemorated in Barry in Nov 2021</u>.
