Welcome from the Mayor 2023-24

Dear Resident, One of my most memorable experiences during the past year, while serving Abergavenny as mayor, was the Community Awards night on 25th April 2024. On this special evening, many residents, both current and former, were honoured for their contributions - whether it was establishing local charities, supporting veterans, motivating traders, volunteering at the Foodbank, or assisting at the market.

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Yet, there were so many more who could have been recognised, both in the room and beyond. We also heard from the organisers of my chosen charities - Town of Sanctuary, Andy's Man Club, and Abergavenny Community Enterprise - all of which focus on supporting those on the margins. It was a powerful reminder of the incredible volunteer spirit in Abergavenny. To all of you who work to make our town a better place, I extend my heartfelt thanks on behalf of the Town Council.

As someone who is relatively new to Abergavenny, my year as mayor opened my eyes to the remarkable talent within this community - whether in the arts, music, craft, sports, or theatre. A particular highlight was Abergavenny's participation in the Britain in Bloom awards, where we won gold in our category and, even more impressively, the overall award for sustainable planting.

As a Town Council, we hosted events such as the Remembrance Parade, the Christmas light switch-on, VE Day celebrations, and introduced picnics in the park. I was also privileged to open the first Greener Abergavenny event. After a pause due to Covid, we re-engaged with our twin town of Beaupreau, France, and I made two self-funded trips there to represent the council. Hopefully, you've been able to catch some of these moments

on our revitalised social media channels. Looking ahead, the Council is actively working on its Strategy and Action Plan, which includes placemaking efforts for the town centre. We welcome public participation in our meetings - whether in person or online - and encourage residents to raise any concerns during the public session at the start. Our aim remains to work with and for all the people of Abergavenny.

About this Report

About Abergavenny Town Council

Abergavenny Town Council serves as the local governing body for Abergavenny, representing the community with 17 councillors across 6 wards. You can find details of all councillors, wards, and much more on our newly updated Town Council website:

The website also provides information on council meetings, councillor attendance, allowances paid, grant guidance, application forms, and details of events happening across Abergavenny.

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We encourage residents to attend council meetings, either in person or remotely via hybrid meetings. During these sessions, you have the opportunity to voice your thoughts during the public session at the beginning of each meeting. Meetings are now held in the Community Room at the Town Hall. For more information on how to attend, either in person or virtually, please contact the Principal Officer.

The Town Council meets regularly throughout the year: Full Council bi-monthly, People and Communities Committee bi-monthly, and Policy and Resources Committee and Environment Committee monthly. Since the introduction of changes in the Local Government Act in May 2022, the Town Council has taken on additional responsibilities, such as producing an Annual Report, creating a Training Programme for councillors, and developing a self-assessment template for council performance. We are pleased to announce that the 2023/2024 Annual Report marks our fifth consecutive report.

Each year, during the Annual Meeting in May, councillors elect the Mayor and Deputy Mayor. For 2023/2024, Councillor Anne Wilde has been appointed as Mayor, and Councillor Ben Callard

as Deputy Mayor. Both Anne and Ben have already made their mark on the council, with Anne focusing on enhancing accessibility and inclusivity for all in the town, and Ben supporting new initiatives that benefit local communities. In addition, Anne Wilde has selected three charities to support during her term as Mayor: Abergavenny Town of Sanctuary, Abergavenny Community Enterprise, and Abergavenny's Andy's Man Club. These organisations reflect her commitment to supporting local causes that uplift and strengthen the community.




The council's funding primarily comes from the precept, an additional charge added to Council Tax bills based on projected council expenditure. For the financial year 2023/2024, the precept was set at £537,086.

In addition, our Town Team - comprised of three staff members employed via Monmouthshire County Council's Grounds Department - continues to maintain and care for the town's wards, ensuring that public areas are clean and well-maintained, with their remit covering everything from litter bins to general street maintenance.

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



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

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In 2023 and 2024, Abergavenny Town Council made remarkable strides toward fulfilling the promises set out in our action plan. Guided by our vision for a sustainable, inclusive, and prosperous community, we championed initiatives across environmental stewardship, community cohesion, economic prosperity, equality, and well-being.

From nurturing biodiversity in our thriving Community Orchard to earning prestigious sustainability awards, fostering inclusive events like Abergavenny Pride, and supporting mental health initiatives, we've demonstrated our dedication to creating a resilient and connected town. Through collaborative partnerships, volunteer efforts, and innovative projects, we continue to build a future that reflects the needs and aspirations of our community.

This report highlights the key accomplishments that embody our shared commitment to a better Abergavenny, one that thrives socially, economically, and environmentally, with opportunity and accessibility for all.



Section 6: Environment Act



Community Orchard:

The Abergavenny Community Orchard continues to thrive as a hub of biodiversity and sustainability. In 2023/24, it retained its Green Flag status and hosted engaging community events such as the Wassail celebration, grafting workshops, and an apple-juicing day. Volunteers further enhanced biodiversity through hedge-laying, meadow management, and a citizen science project to monitor pollinator biodiversity.

In collaboration with Abergavenny Town Council and MCC Green Infrastructure, volunteers of all ages received training through the FIT Pollinator programme, leading to the discovery of rare species, including orchids, black oil beetles, and bees such as *Anthophora plumipes* and *Osmia bicornis*. Looking ahead, the orchard aims to equip the community, especially young people with skills in sustainable food production, fostering a deeper connection to nature.



Sustainability Award: A Commitment to a Greener Future:

Abergavenny Town Council proudly won the 2023 Britain in Bloom Sustainable Gardening Award, showcasing our dedication to sustainability. Key projects included the introduction of smart soil moisture sensors, reducing water waste and emissions, and the goal of achieving Water Neutrality by 2030.

Community involvement played a vital role, with local groups like Friends of Bailey Park and Abergavenny Community Orchard contributing to zero-waste initiatives and the Citizen Science F.I.T. Project, which uncovered rare pollinator species. Together, we're setting a benchmark for environmental stewardship and inspiring change.

A Wales of Cohesive Communities



Greater Gwent Goes Wild:

Abergavenny Town Council was delighted to be part of Greater Gwent Goes Wild, a vibrant celebration held in Bailey Park. The event brought the community together to promote environmentally conscious choices and highlight the vital role of pollinators in our ecosystem. Highlights included the unveiling of a stunning floral mosaic and captivating mural, of a Peacock Butterfly. Later in 2023 the Civic Society commissioned another mural of a pollinating Bee.

With interactive workshops and educational displays, the event inspired visitors of all ages to embrace greener lifestyles and sustainable practices. Greater Gwent Goes Wild showcased the beauty of our natural world while creating a shared commitment to preserving biodiversity and building a harmonious connection between people and nature.



School Visits

Throughout the year, Abergavenny Town Council engaged with local schools to showcase its ongoing work and commitment to the community. This included delivering STEM kits to primary schools and an educational visit to Cantref Primary School, where Year 5 pupils were given an insight into the many roles of the council. Mayor Anne Wilde shared her journey into public service and introduced students to traditional civic robes and the Ceremonial Mace, helping them understand the significance of local government. Abergavenny Town Council remains committed to empowering young minds and fostering a deeper connection between the community's youth and local governance.



Greener Abergavenny

Abergavenny Town Council was proud to support the first Greener Abergavenny Fair, held at the Market Hall. The event attracted a strong turnout of residents eager to explore sustainable solutions, engage with exhibitors, and attend talks on key environmental issues. It provided a platform for the community to come together and reflect on ways to build a greener, more sustainable future for Abergavenny.

The fair featured informative talks on local rivers, sustainable food production in Monmouthshire, and the potential for solar farms, alongside screenings of thought-provoking films on sustainability. Organised by the newly formed Greener Abergavenny collective, the event aimed to raise awareness about the climate emergency, resource depletion, and biodiversity loss, while promoting practical, actionable steps toward a more sustainable community.



Abergavenny Pride

Abergavenny Pride was a standout event of the summer, reflecting the town's inclusive and welcoming culture. Abergavenny Town Council proudly supported the event with a donation of £723, helping to promote it through programmes, print, and digital media. The Council also played an active role in facilitating the painting of the road and organising the parade, ensuring the event was a success.

The celebration brought the community together, showcasing Abergavenny's commitment to diversity and equality. The Town Council's involvement highlighted its ongoing dedication to supporting local events that foster unity and inclusivity within the town.

Benthyg

Since its launch in 2022, when Cllr Gethin Jones became the first registered member, Benthyg, meaning borrow or lend in Welsh, is an innovative initiative promoting the circular economy across Monmouthshire, and the initiative has gone from strength to strength. With funding from the Welsh Government and support from Monmouthshire County Council and Abergavenny Town Council, the project has established branches in Abergavenny, Caldicot, and Monmouth. Abergavenny Town Council is proud to support Benthyg wherever possible, recognising its value in pushing forward sustainability, reducing waste, and encouraging shared community resources.




A Prosperous Wales


Providing Community Support

Supporting Mental Well-Being in Abergavenny



Smart Town: Abergavenny Leads the Way in Sustainability

Abergavenny Town Council has made significant progress in transforming the town into a Smart Town, integrating innovative technology to enhance sustainability and improve the quality of life for its residents. With the support of Owen Davies Consulting, the Welsh Government, and Monmouthshire County Council, Abergavenny introduced soil moisture sensors in local planters and hanging baskets, addressing the challenges of dry summers while helping the town achieve a Gold Award in Britain in Bloom competition. Using LoRaWAN Gateways and smart technology extends to monitoring environmental factors such as bin levels, air quality, and parking, creating a data-driven approach to town management.



This forward-thinking approach highlights the town's commitment to a sustainable future. By reducing water waste, lowering carbon emissions, and creating greener public spaces, Abergavenny sets a powerful example of how technology can support environmental stewardship. With the potential to expand further, the Smart Town initiative underscores the town's dedication to creating a more sustainable, efficient, and connected future for all its residents.

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A summary of what we do

- Paying for emptying of litter bins and street cleaning in the town centre.
- Paying Monmouthshire County Council to keep open public toilets in the town and that the toilets in Bailey Park are open at weekends and throughout the summer holidays.
- Paying for the emptying of sanitary and nappy waste bins in the public toilets.
- Paying for the dog waste bins to be emptied weekly.
- Providing the Christmas lights in the town and arranging the 'switch on' event.
- Paying for CCTV in the town.
- Management and maintenance of all the town centre planters, hanging baskets and other floral displays around the town, and enhancing and promoting biodiversity.
- Financial support to ensure that the town has a Tourist Information Centre.
- Support local events and festivals.


